Too often we get the idea that in order to evangelize we must raise support, learn a foreign language, get sea-sick pills, report to one of "our papers, and sail or fly far away to strange people and customs. I wonder how much time and money is used to prepare to "go over into Macedonia", while there is a virtual mission field in each area, in the United States. Please understand I am not against preaching the gospel to men and women of all nations, but we can do an effective work for the Lord wherever we are! There is no shortage of people who are lost. There is no language barrier to overcome. There is little, if any, traveling expense involved.

Perhaps we ought to ask ourselves the same question raised by Jeremiah of old: "Why gaddest thou about so much to change thy way?" Jeremiah 2:36. Also we read in I Kings 20:40--"As thy servant was busy here and there." We need vision. Not the vision of Paul, or one of the prophets of old, but just enough to see the world as it is lost in sin, and so will we be if we fail in attempting to take the gospel to it. I shall try to understand why long hair, when kept clean and trimmed does not identify one as a hippy, yippie, radical or reactionary, any more than short hair identifies one as a clean, moral upright citizen. But I shall not ape my sons. I will abide by an older distinction, when long hair was a fitting symbol of womanliness. The young may refer me to Samson, to medieval pictures of Jesus, or to the powdered wigs. or braided locks of the fathers of our country—but I shall refer them to Paul, I Cor. 11:14, who said, "Does not nature teach that it is a shame for a man to have long hair?"

When they tell it like it is, I'll listen, even if I like it better like it was. If old-fashinned things as prayer, Bible study, worship, and faith in God ever seem to my children to be out of it, square, or whatever — I trust God's help to have faith enough to yet pray for them, and I pledge with Job, to offer up additional sacrifices for them.

With love in our home, I will answer their questions about the facts of life, but at nudeness or lewdness I refuse to wink. Drinking and smoking are as out of place and unwanted in my home as profanity or the plague. And if experimentation with drugs and marijuana is ever a problem, it will be in violation of my every praymer and request. No laissez-faire attitude will be accepted here—even if the weed is legalized and social "tripping" becomes as acceptable as social drinking.

I want my children to know that I make mistakes, that I am foolish, proud, and often inconsistent. But I will not tolerate that as an extuse for my hypocrisy. I ask them to help me change as children should, and to expect me to help them change in the methods expected of a parent. TWIN SISTERS -- MEVER AND ALWAYS

"Ain't paidnone."

"How long have you been living there?"

it quick, I'm gonna move."

Every organization has a few of those. Who pay no rent. . . that is, they contribute very little to the organization in time, talent, money or influence. But when adversity comes (the roof begins to leak) they want something done. . .QUICK! Their complaints are loud and bitter (cont. page 3)

There's trouble in the land. No wide awake person will deny that. Those upheavels have caused many parents to express apprehension concerning the future of their children. That's understandable. When our children graduate from high school and leave home, many of them also leave the church. Suddenly, they are exposed to the environment hostile to Christ and even to the basic principles of morality. If a young person is not equipped to handle this, he's in grave trouble.

Unfortunately, at a time when families should be doing everything in their power to beef up their spiritual defenses and intensify their fight against Satan, many are permitting the safeguards to be torn down. Neglect of Sunday evening services, absence from mid-week services, noninvolvement in progress of Christian works, and failure to encourage children to become totally involved in church centered activities are some of the more obvious evidences of this foolish neglect.

Parents need to get their priorities straight. Those of us who preach seldom have the courage or at that late date even the need to remind weeping parents of the problems. But when dads and moms begin crying over what has happend to their kids, they could be reminded of the days when they chose camping instead of worship, weekend trips instead of weekend training, and Sunday night recreation instead of Sunday night inspiration.

It only takes one hole in the fence to let the seep out. It's amazing how pro lific some people are at inventing new excuses to rationalize their habitual neglect. I would much prefer a person to be binest enough to say, I just don't want to, than to forever blame job, health, grandma, or baby. What advantage is there to covering up the real facts of the case. That only adds sin to sin.

Parents, give your kids a break! Put first things first. Let nothing interfere with regular church activities and growth, just like you would not let anything interfere with school growth. Be sure that your children are deeply involved in the work and worship of God.

An accomplished young concert artist was asked the reason for success with her violin. "Planned neglect," she replied. She explained: "There were many things which demanded my time. When I went to my room after breakfast I did whatever came to my attention. Then I turned my attention to my violin practice. That system failed to accomplish the desired result, so I reversed things. I deliberately planned to neglect everything else until my practice period was completed. This program of planned neglect accounts for my success."

Planned neglect may not sound good at first reading, but it is essential to give priority in the use of our time if we are to become proficient in the service of God and of man. First priority is daily Bible reading and prayer. "Seek ye FIRST the kingdom of God and his righteousness and these things shall be added unto you." (Natt. 6:33.)

Let us try PLANNED NEGLECT and see if it doesn't work! Turn off the TV set, do the school work before time for the services, let the dishes go, if necessary, until after services. Try it!

LEISURE TIME AND THE LORD

As warm weather settles upon us, we start thinking abut vacations, weekend outings, camping trips, and various other recreational activities.

"Recreation" is basically a "re-creating" process whereby our physical bodies are built up again so that we may perform our daily routine tasks with greater efficiency. It is a necessity for man to take this "time off".

But let us use good judgment when planning these leisure time activities. Don't leave out the Lord! He recognized our need to "get away from it all" because He went away to be by Himself on occasion during His ministry.

Be thankful for the leisure time we have. . . . use it constructively. . . and include the Lord in all your plans! —Selected.

SEEKING THE GIFTS OF THE SPIRIT IS IRRATIONAL

Disputing the meaning of a single word in I Cor. 13:8-10 is not the only way to establish the fact that miraculous gifts of the Spirit have long since ceased to be possed by men. Those who presently contend that such gifts are still with us argue that I Cor. 13 "says nothing about their cessation in this life" (INTECRITY, p. 134, Feb., 1971). Such a view totally ignores the very basic relationship between revelation given through men in the first century and the spiritual gifts also bestowed.

Revelation and gifts were inseparable. Gifts were bestowed to verify the revealed message. Consequently, if the gifts (such as tongues) continue into our time then so must special revelation. On this stumbling block all proponents of modern miraculous gifts trip themselves. The message of God and Christ was first presented through inspired men, but now is given to us in an inspired Book—the written New Testament. Confirmation of the truts of that revelation were abundantly given in the first century (Hebrews 2:4; Mark 16:20). The spoken inspired word was confirmed through such gifts and the word once revealed remains confirmed in our time.

Each of the ages of the Bible began with great miracles. The first period began with the miracles of creation performed directly by God. Man was created (or made) fullgrown as were the animals and plants. Adam was never a baby nor the first oak once an acorn. Great miracles accompanied the time of Moses and the giving of God's new laws through him. Similarly our age of Christ began with miracles abundantly presented to establish the truth of God's new revelation to man. God did not keep on creating man full-grown from dust, nor did he continue to make an opening in seas as in the time of Moses. Just so, Jesus does not still miraculously heal the blind, multiply loaves and fishes, walk on water, nor raise the dead. Neither does he enable his ifollowers to do these things.

Those who contend for the continuation of miraculous gifts of the Spirit do not know what they seek. The gifts

were but the saffolding that is removed when the building is finished. Why would any want to continue the
scaffolding when it is unnecessary? Who would want or
expect Christ to return and be born of a virgin because
he once did this? Who wants him to be crucified again
and then raised in our time? Likewise, to contend
for the continuation of Spiritual gifts would mean the
necessity of having new apostles and prophets as spokesmen for the new revelation to be given? All of this is
but the scaffolding of the church which was removed when
it was able to stand on its own.

What enabled the church to stand alone without the scaffolding? It was the completed revelation of God's word! We can now speak the truth in love and be no longer carried about by every wind of doctrine if we diligently and fairly study that Word (See Ephesians 4: 14-15). If it is possibe to know and speak truth, to stand firm and unwavering for that doctrine, then the "gifts unto men" (Eph. 4:8) need no longer be with us. Can we not agree that what God no longer needs to give his children He does not bestow?

The subject for discussion is much bigger than just I Cor. 13 and the single word "perfect" (although I believe the cessation of gifts in this world is taught therein). One changes his whole view of the Bible and its purpose when he expects miraculous spiritual gifts in the modern world. The Bible loses its position of prominence and importance as final authority if gifts are yet with us. It is no wonder that those who espouse such gifts see little importance in Bible doctrines, and that they desire to ignore doctrine for the sake of the "unity" fashioned by their whims.

LONG HAIR LIKE JESUS By Clyde P. Findlay

When a long-haired television entertainer recently announced his marriage he commented on his hair, saying that Jesus appeared to him and told him not to cut his hair, and this, he said, accounted for his "miraculous" success. But then comes a nationally-known evangelist, who should have known better, saying that the hippies want to wear their hair long like Jesus did! Now the evangelist calls attention to his own hair growing out "like a prophet." Both men seemed to have gained their idea of the appearance of Jesus from Sunday school literature.

According to Phillip Volimer's Modern Students of (hrist "Archaeologists object to the conventional pictures of Christ because they are not true to history. A German painter, L. Fahrenbrog, says, 'Christ certainly never wore a beard and His hair beyond doukt was closely cut. For this we have historical proofs. The oldest representations, going back to the first Christian centuries, and found cheifly in the catacombs of Rome, all picture Him without a beard. All the Christ pictures down to the beginning of the fourth century at least, even later, are after this kind. The further fact that Christ must have in His day worn short hair c an be proved by the Scriptures. Among the Jews none but the Mazarites wore long hair. Christ was indeed a Nazarene, but not a Nozarite, then, like the rest of the Jews He wore His hair short. Further evidence is furnished by Paul in I Cor. 11:14, where it is expressly declared that it is a dishonor for a man to wear his hair long. scmething that no apostle would have said had his Master worn it thus. "

Vollmer continues, "Even from Leonardo da Vinci and lichael Angelo we have pictures of Christ... according to this older type. The conventional face...not a very intellectual face except in Holman's pictures...not a happy one...but very sad... not a strong face, such as a man of the Lord's force and determination must have had."


Brother Larry Hicks is in Parkview hospital for corrective surgery. We miss him from services and trust that he will be home soon.
