SO YOU ARE NOT A PREACHER

A minister in Washington, D. C., related the story of an elderly man who left his farm to visit his son, a popular senator, while Congress was in session. Hardly had they exchanged greetings before the Senator's _____ father asked earnestly, "Sir, are you a Christian?" The answer never came, for the Senator, much embarrassed interrupted at the time and hurried his father a-way.

Not long afterward the old man took a cold, which turned into pneumonia and he soon died. Among the funeral flowers were roses form the Ambassador of Belgium. A note attached brought tears to the eyes of the Senator. The note said, "He's the only man in America who asked if I were a Christian."

Someone has said, "That which is prefaced by prayer, should be puncuated by Practice." How often we fail to apply this principle in the church. We pray for an unsaved loved one; yet we never go to him with the Word. We pray for God to bless the work of the church and give us a great hervest of souls; but when we are asked to help in some way. we suddenly find a dozen excuses not to do so. We bend our knees in prayer for one who is in need, and then promtly refuse to give of our own abundance to help provide the necessary relief. We pray that the Lord will "send forth laborers into his harvest." but we are not willing to be one of the workers our. selves. We ask in faith that a brother who has become unfaithful might be brought back into the loving fellowship of the Lord; yet we seldom go out of our way to say a kind word, or outwardly manifest any love toward him.

It is good for us to pray for a great harvest, but the Lord's petition was for willing workers! He said "Pray ye therefore the Lord of harvest, that he will send forth laborers into his harvest" (Matt. 9:38) There is a time for prayer, and there is a time for action. Prayer was never intended to be a substitute for meaningful Christian action, rather a necessary adjunct.

The church must confront this impasse of personal reluctance. Somehow, we must help our people regain spiritual concern and the desire for personal involvement. There is only one cure for our epidemic of good mannered apathy. That is to deliberately, prayerfully and obediently involve ourselves as the Word directs.

Because of the increased attendance in recent weeks, especially to our Sunday morning services, it is evident that plans would have to be made to accommodate the new students. Our facilities are limited, last Sunday our attendance was 152. There is enough room in the assembly for this increase, but we are hurting in classroom space. For instance, brother Larry Hicks, who teaches the second and third grades, had 16 children in classroom #1 (the right front classroom off the auditorium, which is sized for lOstudents at the most). Other classes are showing similar increases.

Basically, the change involves having two worship services. While one group (grades I through 6, with their teachers and helpers) are having approximately one howr of worship in the auditorium, the rest of the people would be in classes. es. During the second hour, the first group would be in their classes while the others would be in the worship assembly. This would allow for double use of the building (both worship and classes being held at the same time) instead of the worship following the class period, as has been the case. Going into such a program would be a great change but it is felt that there would be definite advan tages for it at this time. First of all it allows us more efficient use of our facilities in handling the increase (actually some classrooms will not be used). Secondly, the worship period for grades I through 6, would be taught at their who get very little out of the adult level of worship. Thirdly, this change would allow for growth which we anticipate in the coming months. A plan which has been studied and presented at a teacher's meeting on Apr. 24 would allow us to absorb this increase by rearrangement of our morning services.



A CHALLENGE TO PARENTS - what you owe your child

YOU OWE HIM, FIRST OF ALL, A CHRISTIAN FATHER AND MOTHER. This will be his most priceless heritage. Unless both father and mother are faithful Christians, it is not likely that the child will be.

Secondly, you owe your child a knowledge of God's Word. God's word was inteded for him, and you are the intended teacher. "And these words which I teach you this day shall be upon your heart, and thou shalt teach them diligently to your children." Less time for television, comic books, and the like and more time for Bible reading and preparation of the Sunday school lesson is a brand of parental oversight we need to inculcate. Bring up the child in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

THIRDLY, YOU OWE YOU CHILD THE RIGHT EXAMPLE. The old axiom, "like father, like son," is an everlast-truth. If the father drinks whisky or beer, smokes cigarettes, or uses profane language, it is likely the son will too. If the mother is unchaste, immodest, or indiscreet, it is no strange thing if daughter is the same. The right example must inspire the right conduct. Fathers, and mothers, what pattern are you making for your child? Can you hear your child say, "Here I come in your steps"?

FOURTHLY, YOU OWE YOUR CHILD LOVE AND AFFECTION.
Not a love expressed by lollipop and unrestrained acttivities, but a love that instills a feeling of being
desired, a sense of security in the home - a love that
touches the soul, droawing out its values and recognizing its glorious potentialities.

FIFTHLY, YOU OWE YOUR CHILD DISCIPLINE, Let the child go unrestrained and you sin against him. Give way to his every whim and fancy and you curse him into a life of rebellion, misery and shame. "Spare the rod and spoil the child" is too much a philosophy and not enough a rule.

SIXTHLY, YOU OWE YOUR CHILD COMPANIONSHIP.

THE BIBLE IN THE WALL

Many years ago a lady in Spain wanted to do something special for the Lord and decided to give away Bibles. While seeking possible recipients she came upon a man building a wall. When she discovered he had never owned a Bible, she offered him one, writing his name in it.

The man was too embarrassed to refuse it but when she left, he resolved, "I will never read this and I'll make sure no else will either." He placed the book behind one of the stones and finished the wall, certain that at least this copy would be hidden forever.

A few years later an earthquake hit that area and an inspector, looking for damage found a crack in the wall. He peered in and to his amazement saw the book. He carefully removed it, hurriedly turned the pages, and decided to take it home. That evening he was found earnestly studying the Word of God. Soon the inspector was on his knees thanking Jesus for dying for him. He yielded his life to his new-found Savior and became a distributor for the Bibles in Spain, selling God's Word from town to twon.

It was not long vefore he came upon a stonemason and offered him a Bible at a very low cost. The man told him he had sealed in a wall the only Bible he had every cwned. The distributor drew from his pocket the very Bible and glancing at the fly leaf told the man his name. The startled laborer sat down and listened to the distributor's story. Then he too decided to have a closer look at this strange book.

The power of the printed Word of God was again made manifest as the stoneworker also became a Christian and eventually a missionary in a foreign land where for many years he labored faithfully for his Savior.

THE GREATEST TRAGEDY

We hear a lot about the word "love" today. Most of what we hear are just words. Someone well put it when they said, "Talk is cheap". Talk only, is not love, for the essence of love is action! Love must be demonstrated! We prove our love by our actions.

God commands and deserves our love(Mark 12:30; John 3:16) The New Testament reveals four ways that we demostrate our love for God.

First, we put our love for God in action when we obey His commandments. Not some, but all of His commandments! The apostle John wrote, "For this is the love of God, that we keep his commandments: and his commandments are not grievous." (I John 5:3) Some fail to attend the services of the church (Hebrews 10; 25), others refuse to do good works (Galatians 6:10) and still others have no desire to be baptized (Acts 22:16). All of the preceding obligations are commandments of God. Are you really demonstrating your love for God? Is it showing by your willing obedience to all of His commands?

Second, our love for God is proven by how much we give. God gave all (John 3:16). Paul said that we are proof, before the churches, of our love(2 Cor. 8:24). The inspired apostle was speaking of giving. How much do you give in time, talents, money and bodily service?

Third, our love for God is demonstrated by how .

little we love world (I John 2:15-17). There are certain things in this world we must deny ourselves because they cause us to depart from God's way. John outlines three of them: "the lust of the flesh", "lust of the eyes", and "the pride of life", saying "they are not of the Father but of the world". We prove our love to God when we separate ourselves from all worldliness.

Fourth, we put love for God in action when we love our brother (I John 4:19-21). Jesus said, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another" (John 13:32). If you love the Creator you will love His Creation.

In studying the Scriptures and reading about the crucifixion of Jesus, we consider it the greatest tragedy of all times. Indeed it was a great tragedy, but Isa. 53:3 says, "He is despised and rejected of men." Really a sad day for the Jews as they had been expecting a Messiah, yet when he came they rejected him unto death.

This isn't the end of the tragedy for not only the Jews rejected him for even in our day when we consider ourselves an educated, intellectual society, we are no better than the Jews of that day for we still reject him today. Unless we accept him today we magnify this great tragedy for the supreme tragedy was not in the Jews nailing him to the Cross of Calvary but in mankind by not accepting him as the Saviour of the World.

Are we any better than those of his day? So many times when we read of this tragedy we assume we couldn't have done that awful thing.

Will you consider your life and what your an swer to this greatest tragedy will be? What will you do with Jesus? Remember, only you have the answer.

Removing the label or placing a false label on a bottle of potassium cyanide does not make it less poisonous. To remove the railroad crossing sign will not eliminate the danger that exists at the intersection. In our country today there is an effort under way to place a false label on sin, to minimize the effect of sin on the soul of man. Many pulpits do not declare that sin is sin and that man will lose his soul in the eternity to come unless he realizes his condition and turns to God in obedient trust. Why is it that preachers do not call sin what it actually is and let men know that it will destroy their souls from the presence of God for all time? Many preachers proclaim what they think instead of what the Bible says. But what does the Bible say about sin?

In I John 3:4 we find out what sin is as the writer there tells us: "Whosoever committeth sin transgresseth also the law: for sin is the transgression of the law." Man is restricted by devine law to certain territory. Sin is overstepping the boundary. John states it this way in II John 9: "Whosoever transgresseth, and abideth not in the doctrine of Christ, hath not God. He that abideth in the doctrine of Christ, he had both the Father and the Son." Then we might say sin is missing the mark.

Some might need to realize that the orgin of sin was by the first man and woman God ever made. Sin came by temptation of the devil. It was the woman who was beguiled and it was Adam who sinned through deception. But both had violated the law that Gol gave them and both were guilty of transpressing the law. Sin had its beginning in doubting, denying, and discbeying the word of God. Sin continues to be prevalent today because people no longer look to the Bible As the authority in religion and their lives. When one disobeys the precepts of the New Testament he is in sin. He must then obey the terms of pardon laid down to find forgiveness of that sin. (cont. next page

All men, without respect of condition or class, and who are mentally sound are sinners before God (Romans 3:9-10, 22, 23). Men are helplessly captive to sin and satan until they look to Christ and obey His will. The entire nature of man, mental, moral, spiritual, physical, is sadly affected by sin. Christ says: "I am the way, the truth, and the life, no man cometh unto the Father but by me." (John 14:6) So if man is to rid himself of sin he must come to Christ.

But How can one come to Christ to find forgiveness of sin and the hope of eternal life? Christ said that the word He spoke would judge us at the last day so through obedience to these words can we find safety. Christ said we must believe that He is God's son, repent, confess Him before men, and be baptized for the remission of our sins. (John 12:48, John 8:24; Luke 13:3 Matthew 10:32-33; and Mark 16:15-16).

Friends of mine, both the horror of sin and the wonder of the Grace of God are seen in the Cross of Christ. Turn from sin to the cross in obedience to the words of Christ.
