True Christianity should be characterized by a forgiving, helpful and reassuring love. All too often it is just the opposite. We see criticism, jealousy and antagonism, where we ought to see understanding, appreciation and fellowship. It never ceases to be amazing how Christianity finds it possible to consume itself in this way.

We sometimes think of God as a being somewhere up above us, looking down upon us with a watchful eye taking into account every mistake that we make. Make no mistake, sin is wrong, and we should not compromise with it in ourselves or in the church. Yet the idea of God as an "all-watching eye" surely does an injustice to his love and concern for us.

God would be better understood as a loving parent trying to help a child walk for the first time. When the toddling child falls only the most unaware parent would accuse it of being stupid or doing something he should not. It is much more likely to see a loving hand extended or to hear an encouraging word spoken.

God is such a companion in the spiritual life. Rather than watching for an opportunity to condemn, He stands ready to lift up, encourage and love.

The members of a loving church should stand ready to help in the same way. Rather than watching for an opportunity to be critical or condemn, they should be ready to uplift and encourage, Only in this way can the church be the understanding, forgiving, spiritual fellowship that God intends. To be anything less permits Satan to use even the church as a tool to serve his own purposes.

THE DANGERS OF PRECONCEIVED IDEAS

Below are three phrases more or less familiar. Before you go any further, I would like for you to read them alcud. Please read them out loud or you will miss much of the effectiveness of what I've got to say.

PARIS IN THE THE SPRING

ONCE IN A A LIFETIME A BIRD IN THE THE HAND

Did you read them out loud? Good, now unless you are a very unusual person (or very suspicious), you read them all wrong. Did you notice that two of them have two "the's" and the other has two "a's" But what is the point you say? I've given you this little test to illustrate the danger of pre-conceived ideas. You read the phrases as you did because you thought you knew what they said before you read them. Now this answers one of the nagging questions that people ask. How can two people read the same passage of Scripture and come up with two different meanings? No doubt there might be many factors, but the most common is that one or both had their minds made up before they read the passage as to what it was going to say!

One of the most terrifying passages in the Bible is 2 Thess. 2:10-12, which says that if we are not truth-seekers, that God will send us a strong delusion that we will sincerely believe a lie and will be lost. None of us is immune from the malady of reading with pre-conceived ideas. May God help us then to be truth-seekers—and to always ask ourselves, "Is this really what God is saying here, or is this simply what I want the passage to say?"

NEWS FLASH'. BUS NUMBER 2 ADDED TO CUR BUS MINISTRY A second bus has been secured for our bus program here. It is a 1966 Dodge, 60 passenger, power steering, extra clean interior. Minor rust repair work needs to be done before painting to match our present bus. We feel very fortunate for the purchase price is far below the price of comparable busses in age and condition. Although our present budget, presented the first of the year, calls for the purchase of a second bus, we do not have enough funds in the treasury to pay for it. Approximately \$1000.00 will be needed in addition to what we have on hand to complete the purchase, do some body work and paint it for our use as required by law. We have Looked forward for some time to expanding our bus coverage into the Howe and Ontario areas. Our present bus leaves about 8 o'clock on Sunday mornings and rarely gets back to the building much before 9:30, which is almost too long on the road for many of the children who get on first. Our connection with the children, their parents, and other adults through the bus work is an act of faith. The Lord has said through Isiah, Isa. 55:11," So shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth: it shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereunto I have sent it". Christians have a holy calling, not only among the unsaved adults of our generation but among the younger who someday will take the place of the older in guiding the destiny of many souls. ... That the average American has 15 times more material "things" than the average citizen of the rest of the world?

He is in part a resourceful student, a counselor, a psychologist, a teacher, an office worker, a public relations worker, a lecturer, marriage advisor, intercessor and arbitrator. In all that he is, he is always behind in his work.

His is a life mixed with emotions. At entertainments he laughs with the happy. In time of tragedy he weeps with the bereaved. He caresses the hand of the newborn and holds the hand of the dying. To understand the work of the minister is to appreciate him. But he asks no pity or sympathy for his work is the first love of his heart. This is why he is a minister and would be nothing else.

This unique quality is not understood by a world, nor by many church members. Consequently, great but subtle, pressure is being brought on the church from all sides to alter this principal of management. Denominations came into being by one church taking the authority over others and eventually one man taking oversight of that one church, thereby one man was ruling many churches and people.

Two things contribute to this situation. One is members of the church inwardly desiring to have the church ruled by anarchy, that is everyone is his own boss. These are the ones that do not

HISTORICAL SKETCH

The following write-up is to appear in a historical survey by the local Bicentennial Committee. It was thought that the church here night enjoy reading it, and to know that as of this Sunday, we begin the 23rd year for the congregation here in Lagrange.

Church of Christ Lagrange, Indiana

The nucleus of the Church of Christ now meeting at AOV south Townline Road had its beginning in 1953 when a few friends began meeting in the home of a Christian family. Within a few weeks a meeting place was secured on Detroit street, above Yates Shoe Store, and this was used until such time that a meeting place was built at the present site at 407 So. Townline Road.

The first meeting of the church was on June 10, 1953, on a Wednesday evening, in the home of Faul and Alberta Sumney, on the site where the Stopher Studio is located. There were 22 in attendance. They were: Earl and May Wilson and their three children, Millard, Mary and Ruth (the first three of which are now deceased); Fred and Devena Cast (now living in Kissimmee, Florida); Carl and Jessie Pieratt and their two sons Bill and Jim (all living in Lagrange; Paul and Alberty Sumney (daughter and some in-law of the Cox'sO and their two daughters Ann and Faula (all living in Florida); Dean and Thelma Hoggatt (living in Lagrange) and their two children, Kathy (in Ocilla, Georgia) and Kent (in Rochester, Michigan). For the first meeting we also had three visitors: One a minister, Doyle Earwood, and a friend, Leon Green, both from Elkhart, and another minister Lucien Palmer from Garrett.

The first Sunday in August, 1953, we began meeting at the rented hall on Detroit street. In the spring of 1955, a building site was purchased from Noel and Georgia Rowan at the present location,

and construction, from denated labor, was begun. An auditorium and classrooms were completed and first services were held in the new building on September 23, 1956. The church realized a steady growth through the years in addition to many coming and going as employment demanded. Because of increased size, a new educational addition was added to the building in 1970 and auditorium space was increased to fit the needs. The balance of the ground qwned by the Rowan's has been purchased with plans being laid for future expansion with more classrooms and new auditorium. The church has now an average attendance of 175, for Sunday morning.

In April of 1974, the church began a bus ministry. This made it possible to expand our evangelistic outreach and to provide a greater service to those in the community rural areas. A year later, a second bus was placed into service. The church appreciates the opportunity to serve the community in this way.

Various ministers have served the church over the years: Faul Sumney, Bill Stowers, Paul Hosse, Earl Garner, Earl Gieseke and presently, Mornan Herron. Mr. Herron and his family were missionary's in Norway for six years previous to their coming to Lagrange in August of 1972. They reside in the church lione just north of the church building.

The church has supported evangelistic and benevolent works over the years. The nationwide Herald Of Truth radio and television broadcasts are supported on a regular basis. Various T.V. and radio "specials" as well as missionary appeals receive assistance as needed. They are presently supporting one child at the Shults Lewis Children's Home at Valporaise, Indiana. A food bank is maintained at the building to help in time of need. The ladies make monthly tray favors for patients at the hospital and nursing homes as well as meeting regularly for special projects.

Is Doctrine Important?

"Whosoever transgresseth, and abideth not in the doctrine of Christ, hath not God. He that abideth in the doctrine od Christ, he hath both the Father and the Son. If there came any unto you, and bring not this doctrine, receive him not into your house, neither bid him God speed: For he that biddeth him God speed is partaker of his evil deeds". 11Jn. 9-11.

YOU CAN BE BEAUTIFUL! (a parable of seeds)

Early in the spring I spaded up the flower bed on the east side of the house, where I had the tulips last year, and went to town for some seeds to plant in it. On each pack of seeds I purchased there appeared pictures of flowers those seeds would produce. But much to my disappointment, there have been very few flowers, and none at all like the pictures on the packs.

My first thought was to be realistic—after all one just would not expect flowers as beautiful as those pictured. But then, one would expect some flowers! And other people do grow flowers as pretty as those in the pictures. What could possibly be wrong with the seeds?

But the reason for failure was not in the seeds at all. Part of it was in the soil. I should have bought some fertilizer and prepared the soil better. Too, I became involved in other things and did not work the soil as others do who grow beautiful flowers. I was more interested in my studies, our vacation gible school and neglected the flower bed.

Anyway I have learned a lesson from it all. The Word of God is the seed of the kingdom of heaven (Take 8:11). The Bible pictures the kind of person this seed will produce. It is a realistic picture and some people have been very successful in developing that kind of personality.

Any failure on my past may prompt me to ask, "What is wrong with the seed?" But the cause of failure is not in the seed. There is life and power in that seed to produce the kind of life pictured in the Book. The causeof failure lies somewhere else.

Perhaps it is in the soil again. In his parable of the sower Jesus speaks of four kinds of soil representing four kinds of hearts. One is a hard heart, another is a light heart, the third is a worldly heart and good heart. Seed sown in the first three will produce about like my flower bed, but seed sown in the honest and good heart (cont. p. 3)

will produce like the picture. It is being done every day. The kind of heart into which we plant the seed is so very important in Christianity.

Then, there is that other factor. People who grow in the grace and knowledge of Christ, do not become so involved in other things that they neglect the seed. They take time every day to cultivate it, water it, fertilize it. They have time for daily study and prayer They do not let "other things" keep them from the worship. They take the time to be helpful to others to minister to those less fortunate than they, and to teach others the way of salvation.

Yes—those who grow lovely flowers have good soil and work at the job—and they enjoy it. So it is with those who live beautiful Christian lives and grow in C hristian personality.
