"When we preach, warning every man... that we may present every man perfect in Christ Jesus. Col. 1:28

Would someone please tell me why it is that if a lawyer finds a flaw in a title to a piece of property and does not warn about it, he has not done his duty; and if a bank examiner finds discrepancies in the accounts of a bank and does not report them, he is a derelict; and if a doctor discovers symptoms of a terrible disease and does not pursue a correct diagnosis, he is a quack; but if a preacher sees flaws in one's account of heavenly treasures and reports them or discovers some symptom of spiritual weakness and diagnoses a gospel cure, many think he is just meddling and trying to find fault?

How can we be so blind? If a preacher or other concerned Christian shows enough love for you as to warn of some danger in your path that might cause you to slip from the heavenly way and be eternally lost, he is your best friend! Do not be angry with him but be thankful for him! "So then am I become your enemy by telling you the truth?" (Galations 4:16)

Every child of God has the responsibility of warning those around him of spiritual dangers. You must warn that friend or neighbor of the spiritual danger he faces by trying to live even one more day without Christ. You have weak brethren who need to be warned against lukewarmness in the kingdom, of worldly practices which have become a part of their lives. The Lord will hold us accountable if we just fold our hands and hold our tongues while people all around us are headed for destruction!

If he is your friend, you cannot refrain from warning him. And even if he reacts in anger at first, he will be indebted to you for his eternal salvation if he heeds the warning you have sounded.

ENCOURAGEMENT

"And we urge you, brethren, admonish the unruly, encourage the fainthearted, help the weak, be patient with all men." I Thes. 5:14)

We have a vast, usually silent, majority in the church today that, like a sleeping giant, could be the source of a great amount of energy for good if only we would encourage them to really get behind the work that is to be done.

There is in between this majority and the "experts" another group who are trying in spite of the discouragement they sometimes face.

Then, we have the small minority who do most of the work.

This situation is of our own making. Hen and women can never learn to teach or do the other things that are needed to be done unless they are used in these areas. You just do not learn to do these things by constantly sitting on a seat and listening. People need to feel wanted and needed. There are so many people who could also become "expert" with proper training and encouragement. All of us have the responsibility of encouraging everyone who is trying.

Sure, we may not be able to say, "That was exceptional", but we could say something, if nothing more than "I appreciated your lesson", or "I appreciated your effort, keep it up". He will try harder next time and the one who is not trying should be encouraged to try. I'm afraid we discourage many be holding up too high a standard to reach.

When the "expert" says to me, "I don't want to appear superior, but ... ", he has already put me down and I'm discouraged. We must use extreme care in our relations with others. Most people can see through our cloak of pretended humil-

ity. Professional jealousy leaves me cold. Most of us need a course in human relations. This is especially true of church leaders at whatever level or whatever responsibility: elders, deacons, preachers, teachers, and others. Too often, we look for praise from others but never pass on an encouraging word to one "of the least of these, my brethren" who may be trying, even though he is not really professional and maybe never will be. He needs our help badly to carry on doing his best.

I commend to you the scripture at the top of this page.



WHAT DOES THE PREACHER DO?

"...do the work of an evangelist, fulfil thy ministry." 2 Tim. 4:5

A preacher could spend ten hours a day calling on the lost and spiritually starved, or he could spend ten hours a day visiting the sick, lonely, inactive, and indifferent. He could spend those hours doing office work and "public relations work for the church", or "business manager" for the elders. He could spend ten hours per day helping the distressed, funerals, and weddings. He could spend ten hours per day studying and perparing his sermons and classes that he has to teach.

So the preacher -- any preacher -- must remain inalequate. He can only attempt to cover the mentioned fields. All preachers labor under this handicap and every preacher who works with a congregation knows this is true. Most people see only a fraction of the problem that faces a preacher, generally the part that affects their lives. They forget there are scores of others with the same problems, needs, and demands.

Bear with him. Let him know your However, you needn't pity your preacher. problems, and needs, and call on him to help. But remember -- he is the only member of the congregation who has no minister.

Pray for your preacher. He is doing the work he loves and would not be happy otherwise. Yes, he is inadequate, busy and always behind with his work; still, he thinks he has one of the most important jobs there is. He would not trade the pulpit for a throne.



DIVORCE

"Therefore what God has joined together, let man not separate." (Matthew 19:6)

As she walked into my office I could see the pain: her burden was heavy, and upon sitting down she began to cry. "He's gone, he just walked out, what will I do?"

The divorce was later granted, but the pain seemed to never go away. There was the children, the dividing up of all the possessions, and the trauma which comes from dividing one home into two.

This problem of divorce is very serious. As of 1971 the United States became the country with the lighest divorce rate among populous nations. Since 1975 there have been over one million divorces reported annually in this country.

But what about the children? Appro nately 65% of all divorces occur in families with children under 18 years of age. Some 1.2 million children are involved in divorces each year.

The causes of this deterioration in what God wants for us in marriage are many. Dr. Jim Lawson of the American Institute of Family notes the following sociological reasons for what we are experiencing:

*The lessening of stigma against divorce. As divorce laws change and divorces are easier to get, there is less social pressure to keep an unhappy marringe together.

*Increasing acceptance of being single. There is a growing awareness that marriage is not for everyone, that being single is acceptable.

*Women's increasing ease in securing and succeeding in jobs. more economic stability on the part of working women, many are choosing not to remain in miserable marriages for purely financial reasons.

*Growing interest in the individual pursuit of happiness. This personal quest for identity and self actualization can cause many adjustments and changes-For the married couple, if both make these adjustments the change can be good, if one refuses a strain is immediately evident.

*Increasing numbers of teenage marriages. Some three in five teenage marriages end in divorce within six years of marriage. Since teenage marriages are two to three times more likely to break up this influences overall statistics.

*Changing expectations for the family. We have now decided that if our families do not fulfill all the contional peeds of parents and children, this necessitates a change.

WHICH TRANSLATION?

There are hundreds of translations of the Bible. Which is the best? the most accurate? the safest? that depends on who you talk to --even among legitimate scholars.

Of course one doesn't have to be a scholar to speak with certainty about versions. Each has its strengths—and weaknesses. I recently heard about a brother whose ministry consisted of splitting churches over translations. That's sad. He has missed a basic teaching of the New Testament which is clear in any translation. Hundreds of thousands don't yet have the scriptures in their own language. So, fellowship fights over translations strike me as less—than—wise use of time, energy, influence, and money.

Nevertheless, I'm taking a stand. And, it's a dogmatic stand at that! There is one version we must have! It's the one Paul talks about when he says, "you show that you are a letter from Christ...written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God..."

There are thousands upon whom the translation debates are wasted, because they're not going to read any "written" version. But they can't keep from reading the Word "translated" into life.

If conduct doesn't square with teaching it makes no difference how accurate the translation is you use. The jot and tittles may be there without a loss—but if the attitude is not Christ-like something is lost in the translation.



THE PERFECT COUNSELOR

"...he is able to help those who are tempted" (Heb. 2:18)

It was a sordid story of immorality, unfaithfulness and twisted relationships. I felt sorry for her as she poured out the horrid details which had turned her life into a nightmare. She concluded by saying, "I don't think anyone could straighten out this mess!"

I was inclined to agree. The wisdom of Solomon could not have untangled the web of people and circumstances. But I was reminded of the help our Lord offers even when the wisdom and skills of human counselors have been exhausted.

For various reasons human counselors are often ineffective.

(1) If they haven't personally experienced the problem they may be unable to identify with it. And if they can't identify with it, their advice while well-intended, may be shallow,

(2) If they wonder how anyone could be so unfeeling, immoral, and foolish as to become involved in the confessed sin, they will be aloof, perhaps self-righteous, and without sympathy.

(3) Even if they extend valuable support and advice, there comes a time when they can go no further. They've given all the help they can, and additional meetings, while perhaps supportive, are redundant.

But Jesus has none of these limitations. He knows every situation completely, and is able to help from beginning to end. His knowledge is unlimited. He never comes to the point where "there is nothing left to say." And he is always available.

His counsel is perfect, his grace inexhaustible.

We are grateful for these improvements regardless of whether or not they are ever publically ack-nowledged and hope to see continuing action in this direction in the future.

Sins of disposition are easily disguised by calling them something else. We fly off the handle easily and we say we are just a bit highstrung and have always been that way. We are covetous and stingy and we call it conservatism, preparing for a rainy day, supporting our family. It is easy to make excuses and fail to see ourselves as God sees us.

Study the lists of sins in the Bible and you will see that at least nalf of them are sins of disposition. Here is where the greatest danger lies for the average Christian. He is not so likely to be tempted to go out on a drunken spree as he is to be grouchy, cold, critical, faultfinding

What we are saying amounts to the fact that one can be a good citizen,

even a good church member outwardly, and still be a poor specimen of a

Christian. The Lord does not see as man sees; he looks at the heart.

Deception exists on every hand. The most dangerous type is self-deception. We can deceive ourselves into thinking we are pretty good Christians just because we do not indulge in fleshly acts of gratification. There is more to be considered.

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AN URGENT NEED

FOOD CONVOY FOR CHURCHES OF CHRIST IN POLAND

The following information was sent to us by the Donmoyer church in South Bend. Please read it closely and prayerfully as it tells of a serious need among the brethren in Poland.

Don Yelton, an evangelist with the White's Ferry Road Church of Christ, learned of the situation three weeks ago at the European Lectureship in London. He is working directly with Bill McDonough in West Germany.

Bill McDonough, supported by the Sixth and Izard church in Little Rock, Arkansas, reported after two trips delivering \$28,000 worth of food to 12 congregations in Poland, that 1100 brethren face starvation there this winter. We only have until mid-October when winter snows close the roads in Eastern Europe to help our brethren.

There are about 1100 brethren in Poland who will need food for the five winter months. If we send \$3.00 worth of food per person per day, we will need about \$500,000 for the food plus transportation costs. Our brethren in Poland have not faced anything like this since the end of World War II! Because of persecution, their families will NOT be helped by the government rationing policies.

We are maintaining weekly contact with Bill McDonough and Mike Davido (Polish brother working in Vienna & supported by Airline Drive in Bossier City, La). \$100,000 has already been collected for this third trip.

Food will be purchased in West Germany and loaded on rental trucks driven by Christians and delivered directly to brethren in Poland. Official party pers have already been approved by Polish authorities. Distribution of these essentials will be made only to brethren by Christians from the West. Brethren in Western Europe, both native Christians and our missionaties, will be driving trucks into Poland. Also a number of Christians from the U. S. will be on standby to drive if needed.

They are asking for \$1,000 minimum brom each congregation where possible Funds should be in before SEPTEMBER 15 in order to transfer them to Germany in Table time to deliver the food before winter.

It would be a shame for such a good work to be discontinued for such a small amount. The alcohol, tobacco, and such industries spend millionsin advertizing their products and we have a difficult time trying to get a few dollars to keep the gospel before the people. 

THE GREAT TROUBLER...WORRY

In some parts of Africa, natives weigh themselves down with pieces of iron. Some are worn around their necks but often they hang them from their ears or nose. To civilized people, it is difficult to imagine. Why should anyone deliberately put this kind of burden on himself?

And yet, do we not allow anxieties to become an "iron collar" around our necks? We make bedfellows of our worries, depriving ourselves of much-needed rest.

Jesus devoted the heart of the Sermon on the Mount to this subject. He gave two reasons not to worry:

- 1. NOTHING IS GAINED BY WORRY. It cannot make you shorter, or taller. It cannot bring you more food or clothing or lengthen your life (Matthew 6:25-29).
- 2. IT'S AN INDICATION OF A LACK OF FAITH. Our faith is in our Father. He is the one who will provide for us. The question is, "Do you trust Him?"

THE KEY: To help us overcome worry, Jesus said, "Live one day at a "time." Our Lord is not against making provision for the future. A wise housewife checks her pantry before morning so she'll be prepared for breakfast. A prudent businessman checks his gasoline supply so he won't run out on the way to work.

What you can change, change. What you do not have any control over, leave in the hands of your Father. Don't borrow trouble. Let the struggles of each day be enough for you. Jesus taught us to live so we would not be overcome with worry.
