#### ARE YOU A "NO SHOW"?


"not forsaking the assembling..." Heb. 10:25

Any church is small where giving is measured in minimums, not maximums. The church budget is not what a church is costing, it is what a church is doing. Small churches give grudgingly. It's a "big" church-regardless of numbers-that gives of its means with great joy.

Any churchcan become small by thinking small.



The real truth is that few churches are striving to build a dynamic fellowship. That intangible quality of cohesiveness is sadly lacking in most bands of disciples. We may abide in the doctrine of Christ - as we must, and attempt to oil a militant program - as we should; but unless we possess that oneness of mind and spirit, we will be drilling in a dry hole. Our natural response to Calvary should be a warm response to fellow freemen. The commonality of our new found riches should forge a deep-seated fellowship that astounds the world.

So the next time we are tempted to resent a brother, just pray for him (Ja. 5:16). When we would like to gossip, just praise him (1 Cor. 13). When we are inclined to dislike a fellow member, just invite him over and become acquainted. When our love grows weak, just roll up our sleeves and work by his side. It will surprise us how enemies can become friends and friends can lay hold on comradeship when we strive for togetherness in Christ.

#### WOULD YOU TAKE A NAME?

A monthly publication "Action", that we receive here at the building is left on the table in the south foyer for anyone to take. If you have read an issue, you readily see that the thrust of the articles is reaching the lost who are dying without God and without hope in the world. The caption "every person has more right to hear the gospel once than any person has to hear it twice" is thought provoking and should stir our hearts to share the good news with those who have never heard it, even once.

A simple method, tried and proven, is that of placing a student in the hands of a teacher, matching them up on a one to one basis for continuing study. Here is how it works. The names of potential students are gathered through advertisements and follow-up work in various countries of the English speaking world. any one time literally thousands of names are compiled and waiting to be given to Christians who will correspond by mail with these God seeking students. lessons have been developed which can be sent as a student progresses in biblical knowledge. student will ask for explanation or ask further questions which the teacher can answer, thereby gaining a more personal involvement with the student in the exchange of correspondence. Many interesting and appreciative letters have been received from students who have been led to obedience of the gospel by one concerned Christian.

In our day to day life of "busy work" and still being faced with the Lords command to "go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature", this has proven to be an effective way to do just that. The beauty of such an arrangement is that every Christian, male or female, young or old, can become a teacher from the privacy of their home. The details of getting started can be gotten from the "Action" publication or from any of the elders. Would you take a name?
