The disciples had asked about greatness in Jesus' present kingdom. Jesus had answered them fully. Greatness involves humbling ourselves and taking our place as one of God's little ones. Greatness involves seeking to restore them when they go astray, having patience and always being willing to let forgiveness wash away the hurt that sin must bring. Greatness also involves rejecting the attractive but destructive ways in which religious people often seek greatness. Legalism, good deeds, hard work—none of these can produce greatness in God's kingdom.

Finally, Jesus has given us his own clear prescription for greatness. Learn how to lead others as a servant. Be one of those men or women who choose to drink Jesus' cup and give up their lives for the sake of others.

Then Matthew recorded a deeply moving incident that helps us see what Jesus' kind of greatness is. As they were going through Jericho a great crowd followed Jesus. Two blind men, sitting by the road, heard that Jesus was passing by. They cried out to Him. The crowd callously told them to shut up. But the two only called louder. And Jesus stopped.

He was on His way to Jerusalem, toward His trial and crucifixion. He was burdened by great crowds who did not care and disciples who did not understand. But Jesus set aside His own burdens and needs at this call for help. The Bible says, "Jesus had compassion on them and touched their eyes. Immediately they received their sight and followed Him" (Matt. 20:34)

Jesus stopped--for the individual in the crowd.

Jesus cared -- for the outcasts whom the crowd considered to be worthless.

This is greatness. To touch in compassion, and to give ourselves to others as their servants for Jesus' sake, is the one way that we too, can lead



Tom Cox is a Psychological Examiner with Professional Counseling Associates of Little Rock, Arkansas. He holds a masters in Xounseling Psychology. He is a member of the Little Rock church. Below is his reply to a very relevant question.

<u>Question</u>: Is there a basic biblical principle that you stress in counseling that you feel is important for emotional well-being?

Answer: One of the problems that is most emotionally destructive and that is prevalent in clients who have strong religious backgrounds, is guilt. I am not saying that we should not all experience guilt, if it is deserved, but to use it as a motivating factor often times causes emotional problems. We as Christians often times do things because we feel we "should" or because we "have to". What this does is set up an external focus of control. We feel someone is making us do something. A basic human reaction to being forced is to rebel and this reaction is never stronger than when we are young, from ages 16 to 30. When you add the contingency of "if you don't do it you can't get into heaven". you create internal conflict. What we do in therapy is to try and turn the focus of control internal. If you begin with the basic premise that we all want to go to heaven, not "have to", go to heaven, then you don't sin because you don't want to do anything that will prohibit you from getting what you want. Terms like "have to", "gotta", "should", and "must", denote that we are doing something that we don't necessarily want to do. I look at the approach that the Lord took in spreading His word. He did not force anyone to listen or obey His words, rather, people freely came to Him. So we don't obey the Lord's word because we "have to", because in the long run, no one ever said we "have to" go to heaven. In using this approach, you run the risk of people justifying clearly sinful actions, so I preface this approach with Galatians 4:13 and Romans 14:13-23. Ultimately, we as individuals, will be answerable to the Lord for our own actions. If what you are doing causes guilt then it is your responsibility to stop. In applying this to young people it is important to create an internal focus of control, because there is going to come a time when they will need to make decisions and they are not going to have an external force such as parents, teachers, or preachers to tell them what to do.

She is also responsible for teaching Opal at home.



DEAR MOM AND DAD

Dear Mom and Dad,

I love you so much! If it was not for you I know that I would not be a part of this great church. I thought it was exciting when you became Christians and began to make changes in every area. The most exciting thing has been watching my own life change. God has really been moving! I am writing you this letter because I do not think you understand a few things. I was in bed last night when tears began to come to my eyes. Amidst all the good, there has been some bad, but I have not felt like I could tell anyone. It seems like teenagers are always afraid to tell someone.

The thing that is beginning to discourage me most of all is my friends at school. In the beginning the jokes and ridicule were non-existent, but now they come everyday. They call me "Bible Banger", "Jesus Freak", or tell me I am a "fanatic". Many of my best friends at school do not want to talk to me any more because they are tired of my asking them to church and Bible Talk. The majority of my time has been spent alone in a classroom of forty. I am always last to be picked for sports and games, if I am picked at all. The kids say I am a homosexual because I do not go out with non-Christian girls at school and never tell stories about my sexual relations with girls. It is so hard to take. I am getting tired of standing up for Jesus. The hardest part of all is that I cannot understand why you never ask me about these things!

Yesterday, one of the kids asked me if I wanted to go to a party. He told me it was my chance to prove I was a man. This girl named Suzy likes me and she told me I should go and that she would give me a ride. I want to go so badly! All the other boys have girlfriends - why can't I? If I just go once and have a few drinks people will lay off me. I won't get drunk. All I want to do is prove I am a man. I have not had a cigarette in a long time either. I never told you that I smoked, but I did because it helped me to handle the pressure. Sometimes I feel like I need a cigarette again. You do not have to know. You would not understand anyway. The world isn't a temptation for you like it is for me. I know it isn't because you would have told me if it was. You always talk about honesty and openness! You really believe it should be done constantly. I heard you teaching your discipleship partner that lesson once. That is why I know you would have told me if you struggled. It would really be great if you could relate!

I am glad you are leaders in the church. Although it is a lot of new responsibility, I can tell you love it. I cannot say that I love leadership as much as you do. When the family first became members of the church, we had dinner together prayed together and the family devotionals were fantastic. Now we rarely have dinner together and if we do, it is rushed and not very meaningful. Sometimes I want to suggest to you that we set times for the family and hold to them. I want to let you know that if we were all more disciplined, we could get it all done. I remember the preacher's saying that on Sunday and it made a lot of sense to me. I am afraid to tell you though. Since you have been a leader, you do not seem like you want people bothering you with their suggestions, especially me.

Mom and Dad, these are some of the things I feel. I hope you will not be upset

that I am saying negative things. They are not really negative, because my heart wants us to be the best family we can be. I am afraid that if we do not take things higher. we will become a mediocre family. Thanks for listening. I hope you read this. Sometimes in the back of my mind I wonder if you read my letters - and I wonder if you read the bulletin. That family section might really help us. It might really help everyone.

Suicide has recently become the lead story in the news. There has been a recurring series of cluster suicides in our public high schools. They could be defined as multiple suicides occurring within a two or three month period. The news media highlights these events which seems to trigger more suicides in the same high school.

Everyone asks the same question why?

I have worked with many teens and parents who attempted or seriously thought about taking their own life. There were a variety of problems you could say caused their depression such as: divorce, sexual promiscuity, pressure to succeed, dating problems, and drugs. There seems to be a variety of problems that most people somehow cope with, yet some people can't seem to handle the stress.

If I could use but one word to describe what they need, it would be hope. They seem to feel their situation is hopeless. It won't get better, and it probably is going to get worse. They don't believe that life ends happily ever after. They don't see their lives ever becoming significant in this world. Parents too many times give their kids plenty to live with materially, but they don't give them anything to live for. It's sad to see kids give up on themselves.


I think of David who had his sins exposed to the public. He had good reason to think life was ruined yet he penned these words in Psalm 119:74-76. "May they

## HOW HUSBANDS REACT TO THEIR WIVES

One of the advantages that a Christian has is the ability to maintain control of his or her circumstances.

Wives in the same way be submissive to your husbands so that, if any of them do not believe the Word, they may be won over without words by the behavior of their wives, when they see the purity and reverence of your lives.

(I Peter 3:1-2)

Christian wives have a power from God that can affect their environment. Jesus said that they are the "light" of the world; they are the "salt" of the earth. Salt purifies that which it touches and light dispels darkness. Darkness cannot exist where light enters.

How then can a wife change her unbelieving husband or her Christian husband whose life is not in step with his profession of godliness? Simply this: submit to him.

One wife who came to me with her husband for counseling said, "Here he is. Do soomething with him!" Admittedly Joe had a lot of things in his life to change, but it became clear in the course of discussion that Sally's constant nagging, prodding and threatening weren't helping matters any. She made Christianity as inviting as a desert. When I confronted her on her unchristlike behavior, she argued, "I'm married to a worm; he's a drunk, he's irresponsible, he's selfish." Sally was prideful and the head of her home as her mother had been before her.

Sisters, if you are married to a worm, you need to be even lower than he is in order to be in submission to him. The only exception, of course, is if he commands you to do something that opposes God's word.

We are not talking about equality; we are talking about position. Jesus is equal to the Father, but voluntarily submitted (positionally) to every command of His heavenly Father. "Have this same mind in yourselves that was in Christ Jesus" (Phillippians 2:5).

God doesn't make mistakes and the husband you have is the only one God can use to humble you, to recreate the life of Jesus Christ in you.

Let's not be guilty of soft-peddling God's word. Paul commanded:

Wives be submissive to your husbands in everything (Ephesians 5:34).

Wives, submit to your husbands, as is fitting in the Lord (Colossians 3:18).

Peter commanded,

Wives, in the same way be submissive to your husbands so that, if any of them do not believe the word, they may be won over without talk by the behavior of their wives (I Peter 3:1).

Don't not tiptoe through the scriptures cafeteria-style, picking and choosing what we will obey. Don't apologize for God's word or try to help God out of a jam by twisting the scriptures to have them come out where we want them to. Only by submitting to the hard teaching do we experience the greatest growth.

How do husbands react to their wives? By becoming either Christians orhardened sinners. It's all up to you, sisters!

#### HOW WIVES REACT

Whether by plan or design, wives do react to their husbands' leadership. When problems surface in a marriage, their cause can always be traced to the one whom God has commissioned as head in the relationship (I Corinthians 11:3-9).

Man was created by God first and given tasks to perform: then God created the woman..."I will make a helper suitable for him." The word for helper in Hebrew means "to aid" or "to assist."

Eve was created "to aid" Adam. It is logical to assume that Adam was responsible to lead in that relationship. Adam had to provide direction, or Eve wouldn't have known how to aid or provide assistance to him.

Before Eve sinned, it appears from the text that Adam failed as a husband by simply not giving direction and protecting her from Satan's craftiness. Genesis 3:6 says, "She also gave some to her husband who was with her, and he ate it." He stood by in silence while Eve was seduced by the lust of the eye, the lust of the flesh and the pride of life.

In what ways do we as husbands fail our wives today? Consider the following problems and their causes.

#### Reaction

When the wife feels insecure.

When the wife takes matters into her own hands and assumes the leadership role.

When the children rebel, the wife blames her husband.

When the wife becomes resentful of financial pressures.

When the wife feels inferior and jealous. The husband praises or admires other women.

When the wife feels unable to totally give herself (body, soul and spirit) to her husband.

When the wife feels frustration from not knowing how to please her husband.

When the wife turns to others who will listen to her true feelings.

When the wife feels unprotected.

When the wife feels inadequate in trying to meet her husbands's physical needs.

#### Action

The husband is not being a spiritual leader.

The husband has allowed problems to continue and even get worse.

The husband has not supported his wife in disciplining the children.

The husband has been spending extra money on things he enjoys.

The husband only verbalizes his love when he wants a physical relationship.

The husband doesn't praise her for specific things.

The husband doesn't make the time to listen to his wife.

The husband has not been alert to the dangers which his wife faces.

The husband has been lusting after other women.

When a wife mentally gives up and loses all hope.

The husband is prideful, never in the wrong, loses his temper to stay in control and never asks for forgiveness.

I am always encouraged by the knowledge that when my wife is not being radiant, it is within my power to change her countenance simply by repenting. Husbands, we must change the areas of our lives which will help our wives be what God wants them to be.

#### DESIGNED FOR FLIGHT

A sparrow isn't worth much by man's standards, but the engineering of a sparrow involves an incredible number of things that allows the sparrow to be able to fly. Just think of all the things that have to be arranged specifically for flight! Here are some of them.

MUSCLES. A man cannot hook wings onto his arms, beat his arms up and down and fly! The breast muscles that would do that in a man make up less than 1% of his total weight. In birds, those same muscles make up as much as 30% of the total body weight. Only with properly arranged and distributed muscles is flight possible.

BONES. The bones of birds are hollow to make them very light in weight. In spite of that, they are unusually strong and have considerable flexibility. Unlike our bones which are rigid and dense, the bones of a bird have open-spaced braces in

them so that the bird can cope with the stresses and strains of flight.

ENEGRY. When a jet airplane takes off, there is a dsafening roar as huge amounts of energy are consumed to allow the takeoff. Birds also need huge amounts of energy available. They have the highest body temperatures of all animals and an extremely efficient digestive system so that they can utilize a high percentage of what they eat. It has been calculated that the Golden Plover gets about 160 miles per gallon in the way it uses its food.

EYESIGHT. Birds of prey have vision that is up to 10 times better than humans. A hawkeye contains up to 1.5 million visual cells while a man's eye has only 200,000. It is obvious that when one is hunting from the air great resolving power is essential.

FEATHERS. The feathers of a bird can insulate against hot or cold. They can fan the air or streamline the body. By weight, feathers are stronger than any man-made material. A pigeon's primary wing feather has more than a million parts - vanes, barbs, hooks, flanges, barbules and smoothed edges which work together in a way similar to a zipper. These feathers compensate for any change in air flow. The feathers compensate for any change in air flow. The feathers on the wing tip act like the propeller of an aircraft. They change their angle to cope with changes in stress. The secondary and tertiary wing feathers act like the flaps of an airplane. Embedded in the skin near the base of the feathers are nerve endings that allow the feathers to be sensory organs. There are some 12,000 tiny muscles that are attached to the base of the feather to control its pitch and position.

Like man's, the inner ear of the bird reports precise body positions to the cerebellum of the bird's brain. There are many specialized structures in various birds that allow hovering or swimming or other special activities. As we see the incredible complexity of birds, we have to ask the origin of this design for flight. To attribute all of these things to chance or to gradualism is a leap of faith as great or greater than to believe that God's wisdom and planning made such a thing as flight possible. No wonder God knows when a sparrow falls to the ground. He has a heavy investment in that sparrow's engineering. His design for our lives is

even more fantastic. We too are creatures of design and not chance.

Have you had a busy day? Rushing to and fro? Trying to meet deadlines? Cover all the bases? Do you ever get a tension headache? Knots in your stomach? Pain in your chest? Find yourself sighing and feeling drained?

We're all occupied with calendars and clocks. There's hardly any time for conversation. Taking a walk with someone. Driving below the speed limit. Enjoying a good book. Playing tennis with your wife. Going to the park with your little boy.

The epitome of our frantic pace may have been realized. A funeral home in Chicago has put in a drive-through service so people can pay their respects without having to get out of their cars. "The working person doesn't have time to come in," says the owner of the funeral home. "They want to see the body, but they don't want to have to wait."

A visitor drives to a speakerphone and pushes a button for service. An attendant asks whom they wish to view. Having given the name, the person signs a visitor's register beneath the speakersphone, drives forward a few feet, and views a closed-circuit TV shot of the deceased person in his or her coffin on a 25-inch screen.

When we are so busy that we have to pay our respects to the dead in the same way we buy fast-food hamburgers, we're just too busy. But where did it start?

-When we couldn't find time to be with our mates and children? To eat together? To talk?

-When we became too busy to cultivate friendships?

- When the length of a preacher's sermon became more important than its content? I am not a naive romantic who thinks the world would be better if we scrapped jets and cars in favor of ox carts and horses. It isn't so much that we have vehicles which move fast that bothers me as that we move about so thoughtlessly.

Some of us need to slow down dramatically. Not stop. Not quit life. Not withdraw from responsibility. But slow down. Smell the roses. Nurture a relationship. Be alone with God in a secret place.

Our culture promotes bigness and noisiness, hustle and bustle. But the metaphors of discipleship used by Jesus were frequently pictures of small and quiet things, modest and steady things. Salt. Candles. Seed. Leaven.

If the pace has gotten too hectic, ask God to show you the secret of peace. Rest. An stillness.

#### WEAK OR UNCOMMITTED?

A very useful insight in evaluating our own lives and helping other Christians is learning to distinguish between a "weak" Christian and one who has simply become uncommitted to Jesus as Lord. The Scriptures provide clear answers concerning both how to identify and help Christians who are weak and those who are uncommitted.

## Characteristics of being Weak:

- 1. Limited in natural abilities or resources. I Corinthians 2:1-5; Judges 6:11-16.
- 2. Easily overtaken by problems and attitudes from non-Christian background. I Corinthians 8:4-7; Galatians 4:8-9.
- 3. Immature in understanding and limited in knowledge. Romans 14:1-15:6.
- 4. Trying hard, but making mistakes and blunders. Matthew 14:25-31; 16:21-23.
- 5. Making every effort to please God, but not relying on His power. Romans 7:14-25; Colossians 2:20-23.
- 6. Growing weary, losing heart, feeling discouraged. 2 Corinthians 11:24-30; Hebrews 12:1-12.

## Ways to help the Weak:

- 1. Accept and bear with them while they grow. Rumans 14:1; 15:1.
- 2. Do not disdain or pass judgement on them. Romans 14:13; I Corinthians 3:1-2.
- 3. Do not cause to stumble by violating their conscience. Romans 14:13-21; I Corinthians 8:9-13.
- 4. Sympathize with them. I Corinthians 9:22.
- 5. Give them practical help. Acts 20:35; I Thessalonians 5:14.

#### Characteristics of the Uncommitted:

- 1. Lukewarm, half-hearted, giving partial effort. Revelation 2:4-5; 3:1-3; 3:15-16.
- 2. Not acknowledging one's own needs. Revelation 3:17-19.
- 3. Complacent, feeling a false sense of security. Isaiah 32:9-11; Amos 6:1.
- 4. Tuning out and ignoring God's message. Matthew 13:11-15; Hebrews 2:1-3.
- 5. Unteachable, close-minded. John 9:24-34; 2 Timothy 4:3-4.
- 6. Not using what one has been given. Matthew 25:24-27; Luke 12:47-48.
- 7. Self-centered, ignoring the spiritual and physical need of others. Proverbs 24:11-12; Matthew 25:41-46:James 2:4-17; I John 3:16-18.
- 8. Laziness, unwillingness to work. 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13.
- 9. Geing consistently unfruitful and unchanged. Proverbs 13:4; Matthew 21:43; Luke 13:6-9; John 15:5-6; 2 Peter 1:5-9.

- 10. Inconsistent participation in meetings of the body. Hebrews 10:24-25.
- 11. Making excuses when challenged. Luke 9:59-62; Luke 14:16-24.

Ways to Help the Uncommitted:

- 1. Call to repentance. Revelation 2:5; 3:3; 3:19.
- 2. Warn, then avoid. I Thessalonians 5:14; 2 Thessalonians 3:14-15.

As we attempt to help brothers and sisters who are weak or have become uncommitted, our goal is to help them decide for thenselves whether they are weak or uncommitted. This can be done by asking them specific questions which will cause them to recognize their spiritual condition. Examples of good questions are: Can you say you love God with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength? Are you seeking the kingdom of God first in every decision? Are you open to challenge and advice? Are you growing closer to God and becoming more like Jesus in your character? Do you find yourself often making excuses for not doing what you know is right? Would you characterize yourself as being hot, lukewarm or cold as a Christian? These kinds of penetrating questions will expose the true spiritual condition of anyone if they are truthfully answered.

God does not expect all Christians to have the same amount of talent, knowledge or effectiveness but he does expect every Christian to be totally committed. Christians who are weak but committed will be making every effort to become strong.

Those who are committed to God, even if weak, have an urgent desire to know God and be right whith Him. (Psalm 27:4; Matthew 5:6; 2 Corinthians 5:9-10; Philippians 3:7-11) They make spiritual growth the TOP priority in their lives.

#### Characteristics of the Committed:

- 1. Teachable. Matthew 5:3; Acts 8:30-31.
- 2. Search God's word for themselves. Acts 17:11; Psalm 119:20-24.
- 3. Pray consistently to have a right heart before God. Psalm 51:10-17.
- 4. Open in relationships. I Thessalonians 2:5-12.
- 5. Eager and consistent participation in the meetings of the body. Acts 2:42,46.
- Taking initiative to put into practice Gcd's will in their lives. Psalm 101:2-4;
   I Timothy 4:7.
- 7. Always being eager to repent of sin. 2 Corinthians 7:10-11.
- 8.Making "kingdom-first" decisions. Matthew 6:19-24, 33; Acts 20L24; 2 Corinthians 5:14-15.
- 9. Obvious progress toward maturity. Hebrews 5.11-6:1.
- 10. Conscious effort to acquire new skills and be more productive. Matthew 25:16-23; Ephesians 4:11-16.
- 11. Evidence in speech and life of total committment. Matthew 12:33-37.

We need to continually be examining ourselves and helping others examine themselves concerning where we are spiritually.

I urge you to study all the passages contained in this article and use them to <u>evaluate</u> your own spiritual condition and help others to do the same. —Joe Woods
