- FOR THE LADIES -

"In Your Hearts Set Apart Christ As Lord"

I Peter 3:15

All around me women are lost and are training their children to follow in their steps. When I go to the grocery store, the bank, the mall, the playground, the library, or for a walk around my neighborhood, I am reminded daily that because Jesus has touched my life and saved me, I have a message for the women around me. The message will change their lives and their eternal destinies when they accept it. I used to try to think of neat and somewhat superficial things to talk to women about. We would talk about the latest news in diets, recipes, child-rearing ideas, our hobbies and so on. But now, in my heart, I want to get past these surface conversations and invite women to hear God's word. The best news of all that I could share with another woman is that Jesus wants and needs to be our Lord and Savior!

The first part of I Peter 3:15 says, "But in your hearts set apart Christ as Lord." That means we are to give Christ a unique place in our hearts. This means it is more important what Jesus thinks than what we think. In other words, Jesus is to be the authority and decision-maker in our lives. This can happen only when we know his life and his words very well. I would like to share about two areas in which we must submit to the lordship of Christ so that we will influence the women around us to be saved.

Submit To The Lordship Of Christ In My Character

Romans 12:2 says that we need to be transformed, which means we need to be radically different than we were before we came to Christ. When we become Christians, we have to make character changes, and when we grow in Christ we continue to have to make character changes. I have had to make three changes in my character in the past year. Maybe some of you have had to make changes in these areas also. Think about the changes you have made and continue to make and determine if Christ is Lord in your character.

First, when I began to grow as a Christian, I realized that I could no longer claim shyness as a reason for not doing things that I did not want to do. I was a shy person in the past, and preferred to be into my own world of family, friends, books, routine, and hobbies, rather than to be out of myself in meeting people. I would never talk to a person about religion because I felt that it was a very personal and touchy subject with most people. I decided I had to change my shy character and pattern myself after Christ. Could you imagine Christ being shy and into himself? Never! Jesus needs to be Lord of my personality.

Second, I was never a person of strong convictions. I would never give my opinion on anything, and would never speak up in a group or class. I have had to change that part of my character. As a Christian, I need to have strong convictions to study the Bible with people, to disciple women, and to deal with sin. Jesus needs to be Lord in my convictions.

Third, I have had to change my character in the area of <u>submitting</u> to my <u>husband</u>. I never really had a problem with submission unless Randy wanted me to do something that I was extremely opposed to doing, and then I would really show him I didn't

have to do anything I didn't want to do! When I submitted my heart to Jesus, he became Lord, and my attitude towards submission had to change. Jesus needs to be Lord of my attitude in submission.

Submit To The Lordship Of Christ in My Time

James 4:14 tells us that we do not know what will happen tomorrow. This scripture says that we are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes. Ephesians 1:16 says that we need to make the most of every opportunity. We must submit our time to God to see women won to Christ. We need to be willing to give our days and weeks, our mornings, afternoons, and evenings, to do God's work. God is the one who has given us time. How can we use it for him? We need to be well organized and disciplined to see that all of our responsibilities are adequately taken care of. I need to meet the needs of my family, and then the needs of the women I am working with. I can do all of this if I submit my time to God and pray for his guidance. It takes time to study the Bible with women. It takes time to disciple women. It takes time to read and study and pray every day. It takes time to serve people. It takes time to care for a family. Jesus is Lord of my time, and I want to do what he wants me to do with it.

When Jesus was on the earth, what was his character like? He used his mind and his heart to teach people and to love people. When Jesus was on earth, how did he use his time? He used it to serve people and to bring glory to God. In our hearts we must set apart Christ as Lord-Lord in our characters and in our time. Let Jesus use us to bring more women to him!

FIRST THINGS FIRST

In everything we do in life, there are rules to be followed. In the game of baseball, you must run the bases from first to second to third to home. If a base runner insisted on going to third first, he would be declared "Out"! In golf, you must begin with Hole 1 first. In football, the game must begin with a kick-off first. The cliche is, "First things first."

First things must come first in Christianity also. (Matthew 23:25). "First things first." If we try to clean the outside of our lives without first giving our heart to God, then we are violating a rule for kingdom living. When Jesus was asked about the first and greatest commandment, He replied, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment, and the second is like it. Love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:37-39) The rule, first love God. That is internal. And second, love your neighbor. Loving your neighbor results from loving God. That is external.

"CHUMMING THE WATERS"

My first experience trolling for king mackerel off the East Coast was like a chapter out of some exotic fairytale. My wife, Diane, and I were with our good friends Joe and Kathy Mattox in their comfortable boat. The weather was gorgeous: bright sun, soft breeze, minuscule waves. It was the kind of day where you almost hope the fish will leave you alone (almost!).

When Joe invited me to go tournament fishing with him, I thought that since it was so much fun on just a regular day, there was no telling how much fun a tournament would be.

We got up before intelligent people normally do and went up and down the Intracoastal Waterway looking for baitfish. On a nontournament day any baitfish will
do, but on a tournament day it has to be manhaden, about six inches long - just
what a mackerel is looking for when its tummy is empty. When we found them flipping in the water, Joe threw the net and hauled in three or four hundred fish,
enough for the day.

On the previous day, we'd gotten about the same number of menhaden and had fed them into a meat grinder. This menhaden mush was put in a sack and became our chum bag. Now with the chum bag plus the live menhaden, out we went to the ocean.

When we finally reached the spot, we tossed the chum bag out. Then we began trolling around it in circles. But to make the area even more enticing to a king mackerel, we continued dicing the live menhaden into thirds and tossing the pieces behind the boat as fresh chum.

With the chum bag out and fresh chunks of menhaden in the water, there is often a feeding frenzy. Word gets out that there are freebies floating on the water surface, and every mackerel and shark within a wide radius shows up for a meal. Up come the mackerel, and if you're lucky, they start hitting the bait on your line.

This method of fishing is similar to a style of evangelism Paul described. But thanks be to God, who always leads us in triumphal procession in Christ and through us spreads everywhere the fragrance of the knowledge of Him. For we are to God the aroma of Christ among those who are being saved and those who are perishing. To the one we are the smell of death; to the other, the fragrance of life. (II Cor. 2:14-15)

We serve as chum - a chum bag that's set out for the world. Not a very glamorous position, is it? Thomas a Kempis said, "God has lots of people who are yearning for the kingdom, but not nearly so many who are willing to bear the cross."

It's inescapable. If you've claimed Christ, you're part of the chum - either the best argument Christianity could have or the worst. Either you're the smell of life or the smell of death. There's no in-between. That's God's strategy for reaching people - to throw the chum bag out and keep cutting up epople and pouring them out so others will smell and come to the ultimate bait.

That's what Jesus did. Jesus brought grace and truth. He was ground up in the meat grinder, because God was drawing people. He wanted them to smell the

fragrance of the love he had from eternity, so he set apart Christ before the worlds were made so he might be the sacrificial lamb. Jesus knew how to identify without becoming identical, and we are called to the same today.

God takes us out in the boat. He grinds us up and throws us back into the waters as chum. When people around us take a whiff, is it the aroma of Christ or or the stench of death? You're either the best or the worst argument Christianity has.

WHAT HAPPENED TO COMMITMENT?

Many marriages don't seem to last any more. I keep hearing it more and more in the church. Sunday, an attractive woman about 32 years old, who was reared in a Christian home and married in the church, told me her husband of fourteen years had left her and their two girls for another woman. Last week, after two years of marriage, a young Christian wife told her husband she wanted her freedom to "do what I want to do." This week she moved out and continued seeing a newly-found boyfriend.

No one ever said marriage is easy. "And they lived happily ever after" is found only in fairy tales. One husband asked his wife, "Honey, how could the Lord make you so beautiful, and yet so dumb?" She retorted, "I guess the Lord made me beautiful so you could love me, and dumb so I could love you." Anyone who is married for any time at all knows that marriage, like any relationship, takes hard work, discipline, and responsibility.

At one time or another, all married people have probably felt they made a mistake and would be happier if they had only married someone else. The grass always looks greener in someone else's pasture. A strange story is told of one of the first ministers to venture among the Indians of the Yukon. Discovering that none of the tribe was baptized or married, he proceeded without further ado to do both. After the mass, five-hour baptismal and marriage ceremonies were ended, the preacher asked the chief which part the people enjoyed most. "Well, brother," said the chief, "we liked being baptized, but best of all we loved being married." Suspicious, the minister asked, "Why did you prefer the marriage ceremony?" Marriage is as long as "we both shall live," not "as long as we both shall love." The longer we keep our commitment, the more we love our mates. The best love in the whole world is that total commitment of the total life to the marriage partner we now have. Changing partners will no more change us than changing clothes will rework our personalities.

Commitment means "no escape clause." The grass on the other side of the marriage fence must be watered, fertilized, and mowed, just like on this side. Whatever we can visualize doing or saying or giving in another marriage, let's give it to the one we've got and watch it flourish. The value, meaning, and satisfaction of our marriage will increase in proportion to the commitment we make to it.

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DANDY DESIGNS



One of the more common evolutionary debates center around the question of how any theory of evolution can explain the neck of a giraffe. Most of these discussions center around how environmental pressure could force the animals to reach higher and higher searching for food. There are massive skeletal problems in such explanations, but even more amazing are the problems of fluids.

In physics, one of the more basic laws of fluid pressure states that pressure at the bottom of a fluid column is equal to the height of a liquid multiplied by its density. At the bottom of a 10' deep lake, for example, the pressure is equal to the density of water (62.4 lbs. per cubic foot) times the height. In this case, then, the pressure is 624 pounds per square foot higher than normal air pressure. That's why your ears pop when you dive too deep in a lake.

In the human body, the same thing is true. A 6' man will have 62.4 lbs per cubic foot x 6', or 374.4 lbs per square foot more pressure in the blood vessels in his feet than in the top of his head. You can see the wisdom in the brain being in the top of his head rather than in the lower extremities of the body. With lower fluid pressure, there is a reduced risk of aneurysm or breaking of a blood vessel. Some giraffes can stand well over 12' tall. Pressure differences between the top of the giraffe's head and the bottom of his feet can reach over ½ ton per square foot. In Nature magazine (Sept. 3, 1987,p.59) is a recent study done on giraffes to explain how these pressure problems are resolved. In the neck of the giraffe are a series of one-way valves that propel blood and other fluids upward against the gravitational pressure. These valves not only reduce the pressure the heart must exert, but they are designed in such a way that, when the giraffe bends over to drink, the pressure in his head doesn't soar and kill him. In addition to the valves, the giraffe has tight skin and fascia (connecting tissue) that prevents pooling of blood and edema. The article states that this tissue is, in effect, an antigravity suit like those used in hospitals.

The article concludes by saying the giraffe is certainly unique in its adaption to high gravitational pressures in its cardiovascular system. I would suggest that the giraffe shows God's wisdom and design in engineering all of the things needed for its unique life-

style.

REJOICE THAT YOUR NAMES ARE WRITTEN IN HEAVEN

There was a missionary who went to a very unreceptive country to preach the gospel. It took him nine years of teaching and service before he made his first convert. Such a humble return for one's labor has potential to cause great emotional distress (if not a little brain damage). How could this man keep on preaching in light of the rejection he faced?

Before we answer that question, let's look at another scenario. I know of a congregation that is on course to baptize 1,000 people into Christ this year, and they are retaining 70% of the new converts. How can the leaders and members of this congregation keep from swelling with pride in light of their great success? What will keep them from saying "Look what we have done - aren't we good?"

In Luke 10:17-20 Jasus dealt with the pride of success experienced by his disciples. When the seventy-two returned from their preaching mission throughout Israel they were full of joy and said, "Lord even the demons submit to us in your name." After Jesus praised the defeat of Satan by the power of God he said, "However, do not rejoice that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven."

Here Jesus gives the secret of dealing with the pride of success; but I believe it is also the secret of dealing with the discouragement of failure. Whether the disciples had been successful or not, they could still rejoice that their names were written in heaven.

In applying this principle to us today, whether our children are faithful or unfaithful, if we remain true to God we can rejoice that our names are written in heaven. Whether the ones we teach and pray for become Christians or not, we can still rejoice that God has forgiven our sins and promised us an eternal reward. In the midst of deep failure, or in the midst of great victory (even the ability to cast out demons), the proper response is not to give up or to swell with pride. The proper response is to take joy in the love and salvation God has given us through the blood of his son Jesus.
